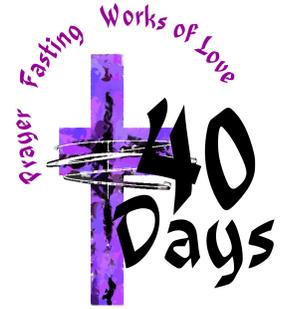

Topic: Lent is the Season to *Turn, Turn, Turn.*

In the late 1950's music artist Pete Seeger wrote and performed a popular song "*Turn, Turn, Turn, (To Everything There is a Season)*" based on the third chapter of Ecclesiastes. The theme of turning is central to the season of Lent. We are called to turn away from sin, to turn back to God and to turn towards one another. In all of these 'turns' we are called to grow in our communication with God, we turn our wills over to him and because our spiritual journey is ultimately social, we turn to our sisters and brothers, especially the poor, to assist them, physically, spiritually, and psychologically. Jesus promises us the gift of the Holy Spirit and gives us the three disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving to assist us in being better ambassadors of the gospel.

This retreat is a journey into the very heart of Jesus where He will allow you to find yourself... His love, mercy and desire to be completely reconciled with you. Through praise and prayer, teaching, scriptural and reflection. Jesus will call you beyond yourself.

Fr.
